



Converting an old farmhouse into Pentreheulyn



A thriving farm holiday accommodation business

'Pentreheulyn' is a delightful, traditional, detached farmhouse built in 17th Century, set on a working and immaculately kept farm, surrounded by impressive countryside it is an idyllic haven for wildlife.

The property has an unusually long and continuous farming history back to 700 years ago with connections to the Brynddu Estate and Diaries of William Bulkeley. Surrounded by peaceful open countryside that is perfect for walking and nature breaks; only four miles from the delightful village of Cemaes Bay with its picturesque fishing harbour and wonderful sandy beach. Cemlyn Bay nature reserve is also close by, with its lagoon which is a wonderful refuge for wildfowl.

The farmhouse has recently been restored and extended; it now offers comfortable and modern accommodation while retaining its original charm and features, having thick stone walls, enjoying the original exposed beams, original fireplaces and window seats. The property enjoys a private and secluded garden with stone walls and mature trees.
